
Food Security Program

Our food program provides culturally appropriate fresh food items to black people in BC. Our dedicated staff and volunteers tirelessly support families to put culturally appropriate meals on their dining room tables. We are all grateful for this wonderful dedication. In 2023, ZICUSO BC food security program provided and continues to provide culturally appropriate food to more than 470 families with a total of individuals of over 1300 people.

We cover the whole of Lower Mainland. Our community members are spread all over from Victoria to Hope. The people assisted are immigrants from 17 Africa countries Angola, Botswana, Congo, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ghana, Kenya, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, Namibia, Nigeria, South Africa, South Sudan, eSwatini (Swaziland), Tanzania, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.

ZICUSO BC Cultural Event

The ZICUSO BC Cultural Event Day was held at Bombay Banquet Hall on the 8th of July 2023. The event, which is funded by City of Surrey, showcased arts and cultural activities from within the ZICUSO BC community. This included music performances, dance, media and art displays.







Seniors' Led Crop Farming

In 2023, seniors actively engaged in a series of enriching farming projects, generously supported by the New Horizons Seniors Program grant Kwantlen Polytechnic University. The primary aim of these endeavors was to fortify social participation among the seniors of ZICUSO BC. Throughout the summer of 2023, seniors, alongside diverse community members, enthusiastically volunteered their time to sow, nurture, and harvest an array of cultural vegetables. Children, 12 years and below were introduced to farming and engaged in the farm activities on selected days.

This collective endeavor not only yielded bountiful produce but also served as a powerful catalyst in diminishing social isolation, nurturing a profound sense of inclusion, and cultivating a shared sense of belonging within the community. Moreover, complementary sessions on financial literacy and digital proficiency were integrated into the program. These sessions not only equipped seniors with essential skills to safeguard against financial exploitation but also empowered them to seamlessly connect with loved ones and access vital resources through online platforms.









Senior's Program

Through the crop farming initiative, community members, with interest in faming were introduced to farming techniques in Canada. This has resulted in a group of community members embarking on Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program in 2024.

The initiatives undertaken in 2023 represent an approach to senior's empowerment and community enrichment, underscoring the profound impact of collaborative endeavors in fostering vibrant and resilient communities.









Research Program

In collaboration with Adler University Vancouver and funded by Vancouver Foundation, ZICUSO BC carried out research to determine the Social determinants of health that have highest impact on black immigrants when they settle in BC. The research has provided valuable information that is now being applied in the various programs by our organization. Both the process and the results have provided valuable information about the challenges that black immigrants are facing and why some of these challenges are not addressed by mainstream programming.



Refugee Support Program

In collaboration with DIVERSEcity of Surrey, our organization has been supporting refugees from Central and Southern Africa with culturally appropriate food hampers and winter kits. The program shares information on housing, employment, mental health and well-being with the recently arrived refugees.



System Design (Community Services Recovery Fund)

The COVID 19 Pandemic exposed the vulnerability of non-profit organizations and the challenges they face in providing services to their members. The Government of Canada, through United Way BC provided funding that is being used for program innovation and redesign of systems and processes. ZICUSO BC is redesigning the purchasing system in order to link the food security program with producers and suppliers of the various items identified as culturally relevant by the research. This will increase the capacity of the organization to effectively provide the service as well as react effectively to any disruption in the service. We are also researching on what products are available locally and who are the suppliers, be they farmers, manufactures or distributors. We are researching on effective storage methods including indigenous methods. Exciting results have already emerged, and they will be shared with the community.






New ZICUSO BC Office
